Short, Pithy Life Rules From Proverbs 25

The book of Proverbs in the Bible has many proverbs that can be applied to a business life of integrity and high standards. If your parents did not teach these to you as a matter of course, a study of these passages can help you to catch up. You will become a wise, mature, and winsome person.

See how many readings it takes to find the shorter, pithy life rule on the right that matches up to the quoted verses on the left. (Note: 'kings' referred to King Solomon, the writer, or others wanting to do right).

Proverbs Chapter 25

vs. 2 It is the glory of God to conceal a matter; to search out a matter is the glory of kings.

vs. 4-5. Remove the dross from the silver, and out comes material for the silversmith; remove the wicked from the king' presence, and his throne will be established through righteousness.

vs.6-7 Do not exalt yourself in the king's presence, and do not claim a place among great men; it is better for him to say to you, "Come up here," than for him to humiliate you before a nobleman.

vs.8 What you have seen with your eyes do not bring hastily to court, for what will you do in the end if your neighbor puts you to shame?

vs. 9-10 If you argue your case with a neighbor, do not betray another man's confidence.

vs.11 A word aptly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver.

vs.12 Like an earring of god or an ornament of fine gold is a wise man's rebuke to a listening ear.

vs. 13 Like the coolness of snow at harvest time is a trustworthy messenger to those who send him; he refreshes the spirit of his masters.

vs. 14 Like clouds and wind without rain is a man who boasts of gifts he does not give.

vs.15 Through patience a ruler can be persuaded, and a gentle tongue can break a bone.
